

In between publications Jack put together a history of AOTS that celebrated our first 50 years of existence. Copies are still available.

The National Newsletter

With the Board's demise there was no publication until 1978 when Al Smith, at that time our Executive Secretary,



started the National Newsletter. It ran from 1978 to to 1987 under Editors Maurice Wright of Toronto (above) and Ken Turner of Edmonton.

Next on the scene was the "Challenge" under the Editorship of Jack Arthur who was at the time our National President. A very well done Newsletter that lasted for only two issues

The Handshake Goes National

John Carswell and I had both been editors of the B.C. Handshake. When we were asked in 1988, by the National president of the day Ernie Stafford we were a part of a publishing heritage dating back to the 1930s.

Two faithful helpers were Ken Martin who kept our mailing list in order and Josh Yashunaka a who applied both his artisic and proof reading skills. It was a privilege and a thrill to write about say, the Scholarship your club presented each year, the support you gave to your own church and the various National Projects that you supported. Then too I was right back into the National scene reporting on its activities. It was no mean feat to take their voluminous reports and fit them into two or three pages without paying favours to one position or committee. Supporting and advertising the Hospitals and their fund, The Harry Colnett Scholarship and the Observer on Tape was a delight that will last me all my life.

I could go on to tell of the many pluses that Editors enjoy and the frustrations he suffers but it is better to just say thank you for the privilege of doing this job.

A special thanks for the many reports and articles, they were in the several hundreds. A special apology to these same contributors for the severe editing that was necessary to squeeze as much as possible in the space available. I will always see in my minds eye a scribbled note on one of Don Morton's newspaper articles covering the Duncan AOTS Club. Don reported,"The newspaper editor cut this article by a third." This Club planted 22 Acres of Soybeans on the farm of Norman Dow, one of the longtime members, cultivated and harvested the crop voluntarily without cost to the club. The crop was then sold * for a little over \$ 9000.00. This amount went to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank and was amplified by CIDA by at least 4 to 1. This means approximatly \$ 4500.00 that will buy corn for African Countries where the need is so great.

A great project for a group who have a maximum membership of 25. They are also active in their support of AOTS Second Mile and National Hospital projects.

How It Works?

Accompanying the good news out of Thamesview was an article from the London Conference the **BRIDGE** section of the January 1996 edition of the United Church Observer. I can only take the space to tell you the bare bones workings of this truly humantarian project.. If it doesn't make you proud to be a Christian then nothing will.. Hey it has been around since 1983 so perhaps you know all about it. . Its such good news for a change about a Christian endeavour it certainly bares repeating. First its statement of purpose

On behalf of its 12 church partners (which includes the United Church of Canada), Canadian Foodgrains Bank collects gifts of grain and cash to assist developing countries with food shortages. Since 1983, shipments of close to a million metric tons of food has been distributed to countries in Africa, Asia, Eastern Europe and Latin America.

Our mission is to use the food recources available to us to avchieve food security, or continued and assured access to fod, for people who are hungry.

And Volunteers

Farmers can donate grain at most elevators at any time of the year, however local "Grain Drives" held in the fall provide a focus for deliveries, and an opportunity for the farmers and the rural community to work together to alleviate world hunger. Local volunteers take the lead in establishing dates and location for grain collection in their area. Farmers then encourage one another to come and share their harvest in a friendly interdenominational spirit - much like the comunnity barn raising of old.

Other activities include comunity growing projects, in which volunteers grow crops specifically for donations to the Bank (There are 20 such projects in the London Conference area) and donations resulting from special church services and fund-raising events

A guestimate of the total attendance would be about 8,000 men who have celebrated their faith, fellowship and fraternity in His name and some of the best memories of their spiritual life.


A Publisher has been found





Foot Prints

one made by him, and the other by the Lord.


