I would like to bring forward some thoughts to the full membership of AOTS that I shared with those in attendance at the 2011 Biennial at Jackson's Point, Ontario in April of last year.

The theme of Biennial 2011 was "Celebrating Men's Ministry: Making a Difference". That is exactly what being a member of AOTS should be all about. As the only national organization representing Men in the United Church, we should not lose sight of the aims of AOTS ... to promote fellowship, deepen the spiritual life of men and develop an effective program of Christian service.



At the Biennial Dinner, I recognized our outgoing President Jim McKibbin, who through his leadership made a difference. He has motivated us to take on national

challenges which have heightened national awareness of AOTS and worked to make the United Church more conscious of the needs of the men of our church. And most importantly, provided leadership that has encouraged us to step forward and tackle whatever task needs to get done. I am sure a lot of what Jim has done for AOTS as President will not be known ... what I do know is when I have seen him in action, he deals with matters in a fair and equitable manner and has set high standards for those of us that follow. That is his legacy.

Biennial 2011 was a landmark for AOTS with the adoption of the new constitution. It reflects the reality of AOTS today and will make the organization more effective. Most importantly it brings new regional focus to AOTS with Regional Councils to be established. I am committed to working with the executive to implement this new direction. It will require your help. I hope that if you are asked to assist in the various aspect of change, you will step up to the plate. It can sometimes be daunting to take on something new ... something which you are not sure is for you, but it can be very rewarding. I would encourage you to familiarize yourself with the new Constitution which can be found on the AOTS website, www.AOTS.ca.

The value of generating excitement through a national or international project was seen this past year with the Dondi Project. The Biennial Conference has directed the Executive to consider this as a possible national project as well as the current Youth to Camp program. These are the types of projects that are reflective of the aims of AOTS. However, it is important that all clubs across Canada understand the programs and feel that these are projects that they can support. This will be a challenge to your new executive and regional councils which I will attempt to address successfully. This is all about communication.

If we are to embrace change, we cannot continue to do things the same old way. We have taken the initial step by adopting the new Constitution, that is just the beginning. We need to form our vision for the future and celebrate our successes. It is my hope to visit as many regional events over my term to carry this message forward.

I was extremely pleased that Gary Ross, Eastern Vice President, has successfully taken up the challenge given to him 2 years ago and is in the process, along with others in the East, of making arrangements for the August 2013 Biennial to be held in Gander. This is important not only to AOTS clubs but also an opportunity to participate co-operatively with other men's clubs on the east coast, this should be a great event and I would encourage as many of you as possible to attend, this will be an opportunity of a lifetime. I am also hoping that the following biennial in 2015 will be in the West. I am tossing out that challenge as it is important under our new Constitution that all clubs whether in the West, Central or East have an opportunity to participate in this type of national event.

I look forward to meeting as many of you as possible during my term as President. Please feel free to contact me by whatever means you is most comfortable for you. If you have any ideas, concerns to share or want to get involved in the changing AOTS.



HMI's program teaches athletes to strive for excellence and recognize that



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

### Two Volunteers Celebrate 112 Years of Combined Service

Harry Burdon and Ernie Orpin, both members of the United Church AOTS Men's Club, live their lives according to the Club's creed: "As one that serves." They have volunteered at Sunday worship services at Riverview Health Centre for a combined total of 112 years and, as Harry puts it, "I'm happy that at my age I can still serve – so I will!"

These two dedicated volunteers first became involved at Riverview in the 1950s through the AOTS, and they've been going strong ever since. They transport patients and residents in their wheelchairs from their rooms to Sunday services, which today take place in the Worship Centre. Before the new facility opened in 1997, Harry and Ernie wheeled people to two different locations in the old buildings.

"There is a tremendous need to help people in this way," explains Ernie. "Many people at Riverview would not be able to attend services without the volunteers who come in to help. We are happy that we can fulfill this need."

For Harry's part, coordination of the volunteers was part of his job for over 30 years of his tenure at the Centre. He would contact other congregations to drum up helpers to come in on Sunday. Today, there can be 50 to 60 patients and residents attending the services, so it can take quite a crew of helpers to get people settled, either in the Worship Centre itself or in the nearby Thomas Sill Auditorium, which is connected via audio-visual feed.

Harry bowed out of that role recently when a weekend volunteer from the Centre started to do the organizing. "We are now seeing a few young kids from schools and churches coming in to do the wheeling," he says. "This is great because the need is still there, and having younger people come in will ensure the service continues."

Harry continues to wheel people to the services, mainly taking care of residents on the Alzheimers unit. Ernie likes to attend his own church some Sundays, but still comes in every other Sunday to arrange chairs in the Worship Centre to make sure the large crowd will be comfortably accommodated.

Why do they continue after so many years? "I've made good friends with patients and residents, and I know it means a lot to them — they look for us on Sundays," says Ernie. Harry agrees, and adds: "Working with people at Riverview has helped me to be patient — I see people who are challenged in many ways, but they are cheerful anyway."

## Thought for today...

### Men – Followers – Servants

(31-32a) Then Jesus began to teach his followers that the Son of Man must suffer many things. He taught that the Son of Man would not be accepted by the older Jewish leaders, the leading priests, and the teachers of the law. He said that the Son of Man must be killed and then rise from death after three days. Jesus told them everything that would happen. He did not keep anything secret.

(32b-33) Peter took Jesus away from the other followers to talk to him alone. Peter criticized him for saying these things. But Jesus turned and looked at his followers. Then he criticized Peter. He said to Peter, "Get away from me, you are talking like Satan. You don't care about the same things God does. You care only about things that people think are important."

(34-38) Then Jesus called the crowd and his followers to him. He said, "Any of you who want to be my followers must stop thinking about yourself and what you want. You must be willing to carry the cross that is given to you for following me. Any of you who try to save the life you have will lose it. But you who give up your life for me and for the Good News will save it. It is worth nothing for you to have the whole world if you yourself are lost. You could never pay enough to buy back your life. People today are sinful. They have not been faithful to God. As you live among them, don't be ashamed of me and my teaching. If that happens, I will be ashamed of you when I come with the glory of my Father and the holy angels.

Mark 8:31-38 (Easy-to-read version)

There may be legitimate reasons why some ministers won't be personally involved in men's ministry, in AOTS or in a men's group of any description. Ministers are busy with responsibilities in a multitude of constituencies. Said spiritually, they are shepherds of a flock. It is a demanding calling.

Some ministers have been burned after several tries to establish or maintain men's groups. The men may not show enough interest if the minister tries to do too much, or the men may form cliques such that new-comers are not welcomed, and they eventually will grow old and have to withdraw from leadership.

In many instances men's ministry has a big black eye, whether AOTS or Saturday breakfast club or some other men's group. The mental image is a separate group of the most zealous men in the church. Many of these men are viewed as kooky, or even a threat to the minister. Instead of encouraging the minister, they may act like they know something the minister doesn't. It can be a real downer.

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In our Bible passage, Jesus was trying to help his followers understand who he is and what it means to be true followers. Is it any easier for us as men today than it was for Peter to understand, to accept and then to follow Jesus' teaching? Do we care about the same things God does? Or, like Jesus accused Peter, do we only care about things that people think are important?

It is good to get together as men for fellowship, for support and for work to help others. But Jesus said if we want to be true followers of his, we must be willing to show we are followers and accept the consequences. Don't be ashamed of Jesus' teachings. Be willing to show others you believe.

Perhaps in our ministry with men, we need to figure out how to mentor men in becoming "followers" of Jesus. Ministry with men needs to "disciple" men in their existing roles, even if they already are elders, stewards, ushers, choir members, or youth workers. It is not enough to be a good "worker", eventually we will all "burn out" if working is all we do. We all need to be "discipled" into becoming true followers of Jesus.

Jesus won the world by winning 12 ordinary men. What would happen if your church had a group of men whose main passion was to see Jesus Christ receive glory in everything they did?

Some questions to consider as you ponder that group of men.

- How can we worship a God we don't know?
- How can we serve effectively if we don't know God wants to use us?
- How can we bring about social justice if we don't know what is just?
- How can we have genuine fellowship unless we are taught to love and not be selfish?
- How can we become followers unless we hear the word of the Lord?

Let us pray -

God, we are not as strong as we would like to be.

But we have some strength

And we know that, through prayer, we can experience your support.

It is difficult for us to stop thinking about ourselves

And what we want.

Help us to see what you want

And what you are asking us to do as your servants.

In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.



### Greetings from Lakefield (Ont.)United Church AOTS Men's Club.

Two thousand and twelve will be the  $50^{\text{th}}$  Anniversary of our club. Our charter was granted in 1962 and we were the  $632^{\text{nd}}$  club in Canada. I wonder how many there are now?

Lakefield AOTS has been in the Christmas tree business for 41 years. Proceeds from the sale of trees together with the proceeds from our three annual concerts fund the charitable activities of our group. Trees are ordered in the Fall from a Pontypool tree farm and also from a tree farm in the Apsley area. Pontypool trees are delivered wrapped in binder twine to the church the last weekend in November. AOTS members together with a number of volunteers from the congregation go with a flatbed truck to Apsley and load precut trees onto the truck which is then driven to the church in Lakefield and unloaded. Fortunately, we have a vacant lawn beside the church.

A week or so previous to the arrival of the trees, the men will have set up rows of wooden rail fences upon which the trees will be leaned for display to prospective buyers. Our minister does not wish trees to be sold during church service on Sunday morning but Sunday afternoon sales are usually brisk. We try to staff the weekends with two



volunteers and the weekday sales can usually be handled by one person. Our hours are from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Our trees vary in size from mini 3 ft. trees to 15 footers. We cut and trim trees to the buyers wishes. We have spruce, balsam, fraser fir and scotch pine. Scotch pine is in short supply and we had very few this past Christmas.

Prices range from \$15.00 to \$45.00 for the largest trees and are usually less than other sellers in our area. We order between 300 and 335 trees

each year and are usually sold out by the third week in December.

Because AOTS members are getting "long in the tooth," the past year we invited other members of the congregation, both male and female, to help out with sales. The response was excellent and as a result, one half of the profit (\$2500.00) was contributed to the church general fund.

Profits from the sale of trees and our annual concerts are used to support kids from our church and the wider community to attend Camp Quin-mo-lac each summer. Lakefield Community Care, Five Counties Children's Centre and various other youth projects in our community are also supported. We enjoy what we do and with an active membership of 20 to 25 members, we hope to carry on for some years to come.

We made a profit of approximately \$3200.00.

Dec 8 - A Carol Festival was held at Sacred Heart Church . It was a great success with all donations to Secret Santa and the Food Bank.

This brings another year to a close. We thank everyone for the support we have received in the past year. We look forward to the year ahead. We have a total of 25 members and there are several people that help out when the opportunity arises.

### WOW!!! A First - News from the Yukon

The United Church men of the Yukon don't have an active AOTS club, however they do have an active Men's Club that has been involved with supporting the community, youth and Christian camping since the sixties.

One of their main focuses is that the United Church is one of the main driving force behind the Braeburn Lake Christian Camp Association. This ecumenical group is made up of congregations from the Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran and United Churches of the Yukon. The Association owns and operates a summer camp on the shores of Braeburn Lake.

The camp hosts children from the ages of 6-15 for up to five weeks each summer. Traditionally children attend PeeWee Camp, Junior Camp or Teen Camp. Braeburn camp also has a successful Councillor in Training (CIT) program that encourages teenage members of our congregations to participate in camp and share in a leadership role.

Volunteers are the heart of Braeburn Camp. Whitehorse United Church has supported the camp with financial and human resources since the late 1960's.

One of the ways the United Church men help out with fundraising is that they host an ecumenical Men's Breakfast Group every month that brings in over thousand dollars every year. These funds are usually earmarked to special maintenance projects. Last summer the men built and put in a new dock for the camp and this past year they upgraded all the windows in the dining hall.

The Men's Breakfast Group is made up of men from church congregations in Whitehorse. The Group meets at 7:00 am on the first Wednesday of every month over breakfast, hosted on rotational bases at the Anglican, Lutheran, Catholic and United Churches. Funds are raised for Braeburn Camp from the monthly breakfast. The group also hosts an Annual Spaghetti Dinner (usually) on the first Friday in April. It was started to help pay back a no-interest loan to the Yukon Government for the installation of power to a remote camp that is way off the grid. The Spaghetti Dinner raises around twenty-seven hundred every year and it has been going on for roughly 10 years now. This year will be the final payment and then, if they continue with the Annual Spaghetti Dinner, it will mean more money for special maintenance projects or possibly other camp needs.

When talking with one of the Braeburn Camp representatives who has been on the camp board for over 20 years, Jennifer Moorlaig said "As the Camp treasurer the money is always a great thing but it pales to



the amount of hard work that these men put into the camp". She added "the dedication, commitment and passion that these men have for the camp is what keeps this place going".

John Cooke led this work and he will be working closely with new president Dave Morris in transitioning us through to the full implementation of those changes.
