Devotion for April 2014

Scripture: Matthew 28 vs.1 to 8 St. Mark vs. 9 to 16

Devotion for December 2014

Scripture: Luke 2 1-29

## Reflection:

Devotion for March 2014

Hymn: For the Beauty of the earth VU 226

Scripture: Job 37.6    Genesis 8:22

Reflection:

Devotion for May 2014

Reflection:

Mother Day is a pretty recent celebration: roughly since 1908 and started by a mother in the US, and eventually spread around the world, however similar celebrations were in affect many centuries before. "Honour thy father and mother," was an edict to the Jews according to the sixth commandment. Labour day has progressed from a protest to a celebration enjoyed by all, unions, workers, kids, house wives, retirees and even bosses. Discussion
