#### **CHURCH & COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE**

The Harry Colnett Scholarship recipient was determined at a meeting of our Committee in mid-December. Andrew Vickerson received the \$1000 cheque at the end of December or first of January.

A native of Prince Edward Island, Andrew achieved his B.Sc.(Hons)(Biology) at St. Francis Xavier University in May of 2006. He is now working towards his M.Sc.(Aquaculture) at Memorial University in St John's, NL.

One of his referees said this of him: "Andrew has chosen Aquaculture - the farming of aquatic plants and animals for food production - as his career endeavour. Andrew is thoroughly devoted to the topic, and shows promise as a young researcher in the field of aquatic food production through farming. He has the necessary skills to further the science of shellfish aquaculture for the benefit of Canadian aquaculture farm operators. I have no doubt that he will be among the group of leaders in this field in the future". The other referee stated - "His program in shellfish aquaculture is focused toward the improvement of mussel aquaculture in Newfoundland and has many applications for world-wide food production".

The Scholarship Committee also reviewed a second application from a lady doing PhD research in the field of Human Nutrition, including field work in Kenya, at McGill University. We felt that her thrust in the development of food security on the African continent deserved a Scholarship. As there was only one \$1000 award possible in 2007, we decided to carry her name forward to a time in 2008 when sufficient funding became available! So, more about her at a later time.

#### A HISTORY OF NORTHMINSTER AOTS

Northminster United Church in Oshawa, Ontario, (Bay of Quinte Conference) has its own history with AOTS. From research carried out during the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations of Northminster United Church, there is documented evidence in the church archives of an AOTS Club receiving its charter in 1931. The first president was J.B. Reed. As



years went on, the club disbanded and was again re-organized in 1949. Harold Hawkshaw, who is still active in the congregation, was a member of Northminster AOTS during the 1950's. During the 1960's, Dr. Harry Mellow, along with familiar names like, Ross White, Victor Cubitt, Ernie Cook, Herb Chesebrough, Roy Barrand and Jim Young, kept the club alive.

As sometimes happens, there was another period when the club ceased to be active. Then, in 1995, (Rev.) Richard Parker ignited the flame of enthusiasm and rallied a core group of people together and a new charter was received. With Richard as President, followed by Bill Nash (1998), the late Harry Gibbard (1999 - 2006), and currently, Morley Davidson, the Northminster United Church AOTS Men's Club continues to carry on. The Club has been involved in numerous projects, providing Soup and Sandwich Luncheons on Outreach Sunday and at other times during the year, the annual Pancake Supper on Shrove Tuesday, giving financial assistance to youth attending Camp Quin-Mo-Lac each year and financially supporting many other ongoing



projects within the Northminster Church. The men meet for breakfast fellowship, the second Sunday of the month, excluding June, July and August.

The National President of AOTS, Bill Love, invited all clubs to celebrate the 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of AOTS, during the week of January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2008. Northminster AOTS recognized the day with a Lasagna Lunch and "birthday cake" following worship, Sunday, January 13<sup>th</sup>. Over 100 members of the congregation joined in the celebration!

AOTS is looking for new members. All men are encouraged and welcome to join AOTS. This is a wonderful opportunity to get to know your fellow members of Northminster and share in the ongoing work of our Lord and Saviour in the church.

#### **Spiritual Life and Leadership Column**

At the beginning of each month you will find a new devotional message on the website, <a href="www.aots.ca">www.aots.ca</a>, under "Devotions", in the format which was used in the Spiritual Life Handbook. You may wish to use these in your monthly meetings.

In this issue of "The Handshake" the **thought for today** is based on material from a private project of Jim Taylor and Ralph Milton. Their initial material is available on <a href="www.story-lectionary.com">www.story-lectionary.com</a>. The **Story Lectionary** is a volunteer venture with no remuneration for Jim or Ralph or for Linnea Good who provides music and word "to bring scripture and theme alive". They feel that "the 'Kairos' time has come to devise an additional resource that speaks to the hearts as well as the minds of contemporary Christians. Many leaders.....have been advocating.....the extensive use of story to invoke the imaginations and awaken the spiritual senses of those hearing the sermon,"

Marcus Borg, in *The Heart of Christianity* stated "The emerging paradigm...is not very much concerned with the historical factuality of the Bible stories, but much more with their meanings. It is not bothered by the possibility that the story of Jesus' birth and resurrection are metaphorical rather than literally factual accounts. It asks, "Whether it happened this way or not, what is the story saying? What meaning does it have for us?"

There are at least two ways of "knowing" – the "intuitive" and the "intellectual". Most of what we hear today in our churches fosters the intellectual at the expense of the intuitive. Both are needed to enter the full experience of worship. The intuitive way of knowing is at home in the world of timelessness and eternity and is nurtured by story, drama and the visual arts.

According to Jim, Ralph and Linnea, the "emerging church" needs a preaching resource that is responsive to the needs of the lay leaders who are emerging at all levels of the church, including preaching. Early Hebrew theology was based on story, as was the ministry of Jesus. He was a master of the parable and used it almost to the exclusion of anything else. A First Nations story-teller from Washington state offers a helpful perspective. "I tell the people," he said, "that I don't know if things happened this way. But this story is true."

We invite you to sample the stories from the story lectionary, and we invite your comments and suggestions.

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#### Regeneration – As One That Serves

In the February devotion on the AOTS website, <a href="www.aots.ca">www.aots.ca</a>, it is noted that the season of Lent is "about engaging in the ongoing business of renewal, regeneration and new birth." Lent can be a time for meditation. In recent years, meditation has been promoted as a kind of relaxation exercise for busy people who find it difficult to rest. We are recommended to incorporate into our routine a little time each day – perhaps up to an hour – to sit in silence and focus on a word or an image. Scientific evidence supports the value of meditation as a tool for productivity and efficiency at work. But the original purpose of meditation was spiritual, to withdraw the mind from everyday concerns so that it might come in contact with the divine. So that the mind and the soul might renew, regenerate and we might experience rebirth.

As a suggestion, you may wish to meditate on the regeneration initiatives which were identified at the AOTS National Council meeting held at Trent University, Peterborough in August 2007. An update on the initiatives as described in the Fall 2007 issue of The Handshake shows the following:

- 1 **Communication** the website (<u>www.aots.ca</u>) continues to expand as more information is fed to our webmaster, Mark Browning and information and inspiration is spread through the Handshake as this electronic issue is brought to publication by the editor, Harold Lorenz
- 2 **Dues** the letter of invitation for individual membership went to all congregations in the October Infopac under the name of our moderator, Rev. David Guiliano. We know that some new members have been accepted. Your work with neighbouring churches, especially through 85<sup>th</sup> birthday parties, is helping to keep the name, the aims, the objectives and some of the successes of AOTS in front of people of the United Church of Canada.
- 3 the **task group** examining new projects outside Canada continues to review suggested ideas and is currently reviewing projects with General Council personnel for total church-wide approval of our initiatives. We trust we will jointly identify a project or projects which AOTS can champion which will appeal to many men of the United Church of Canada to fund and in which active physical participation is possible.
- 4 the work with the **Kairos young adults** event is proceeding and is outlined in detail elsewhere in this issue as well as on the website. This should be a most worthwhile event for young men and women in the 18 to 30 age group. Please review the details and invite and support those in this age group in your congregation and your local presbytery.
- 5 -the **camp for youth** project is at the planning stage within Toronto Conference AOTS executive.

We welcome John Cooke of Sarnia to the Regeneration Committee and would welcome your input on any of these initiatives and/or any other suggestions or proposals you wish to have considered locally or nationally.

#### What are we getting ourselves into?

"Instead, whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave – just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many." Matthew 20:26-28

When Jesus came by and asked James and John to follow him, they had simply left their father, Zebedee, standing there holding his fishing nets. Their mother, Salome, thought it was a "hare-brained" idea, but decided to go along with them to make sure her boys had enough to eat and clean clothes to wear.

She followed them wherever they travelled. At one time as they were travelling to Jerusalem, Jesus had a special meeting with just the 12 disciples. Salome pried out of her sons what Jesus had told them. They told her that Jesus had said he would be put on trial and handed over to be crucified, and would die but then be raised up on the third day.

## **Bestowing the Gifts**

#### Preparing the Legacy of the Elders

Trinity United Church in Newmarket, Ontario once again hosted this year's Fall Rally on November 3, 2007. Our host church AOTS provided a buffet style continental breakfast and a wonderful lunch served by the Trinity UCW.

Our keynote theme speaker was Reverend David MacDonald, a member of the Residential Schools Steering Committee of the United Church. David MacDonald was elected to Parliament six times representing ridings in Western PEI and Rosedale and served as a cabinet minister for Joe Clark's government. He served Canada on numerous occasions both as a government and U.N. representative on myriad international commissions. Reverend MacDonald's spoke on the topic of *Bestowing the Gifts of Eldership*.

This presentation was followed by three workshops facilitated by Jim Patterson, George Bishop and Jim McKibbin.

Jim McKibbin lead a workshop entitled the *Legacy of Eldership*. Participants were asked to recall any life changing events (i.e. a near death experience) and describe how they reacted, what they did, what wisdom they found.

George Bishop led a session on *Engaging Younger Men*. George has been leading regeneration work in the AOTS for several years. His discussion group focused on new ways of approaching younger men regarding men's spirituality. The discussion included consideration of the Emerging Spirit campaign targeted to 30 – 45 year olds.

Jim Patterson led a session entitled *Pass it On* which examined the issue of intergenerational approaches to inspiring youth work in the church. The session focused on camp work and the decision of the Toronto Conference AOTS to support the *7 Years of Plenty* Campaign to restore camp work in the Toronto Conference.

After the lunch break, Jim McKibbin, president-elect of the National AOTS, made a presentation entitled *Servant Leadership*. That presentation is reproduced elsewhere in The Handshake.

Reverend Brigadier-General (Ret'd) David Estey acted as Chaplain and led us in worship in closing out the day. His reflection was entitled *Learning from the Spider*.

The 13<sup>th</sup> Fall Rally was a wonderful day of spiritual fulfillment as the AOTS Toronto Conference addressed the question of 'leaving it all on the ice'.

#### **On Servant Leadership**

#### Notes from Jim McKibbin's remarks at the AOTS Fall Rally, Newmarket, ON, November 3, 2007.

We live in an immortality culture and a self-improvement society, a fast food nation bent on instant gratification and addicted to ten second sound bites.

That is not to say that people are not conscious of their immortality. They are, however, culturally assailed with images that evoke the opposite perspective. Death is seen as an interruption to life and not as a natural process of it.

We are reminded of the fact that no one at the point of death wishes that they spent more time at the office.

Elders have a tremendous contribution to make to spirituality and congregational development in the United Church of Canada. Bestowing the gifts of that wisdom is a matter of listening well to the needs of those who look for guidance. Elders understand the dangers of living in an 'immortality culture'. They know more than most that life is not a dress rehearsal. As Elders we know the value of the hockey phrase to 'leave it all on the ice'.

As activists in As One That Serves, we understand Jesus' teaching on this question; not only from Luke 22: 26 "but not so with you; rather the greatest among you must become like the youngest and the leader **as one that serves.**"

But also ...

You know that those who are regarded as rulers of the Gentiles, lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be a servant and whoever wants to be first must be slave to all". (Mark 10:42-45)

The legacy of eldership and the servant leadership required of it, necessitates that we act as Jesus acted.

Recently we have seen in Canada this discussion of 'reasonable accommodation'; that those of us who have been here need only 'reasonably' accommodate those who are coming anew.

What could be wrong with acting 'reasonably'? Would Jesus have acted reasonably? Probably not. Jesus was a radical accommodator. Jesus accommodated the lepers and the prostitutes and the tax-collectors. Jesus accommodated everyone. Jesus saw the face of God in everyone.

Is this debate in Quebec no less the same issue? And who is it, may we ask, who is raising the discussion, "reasonable accommodation only".

"Those of us who have been here" most often means those of us who are the descendants or inheritors of the conquerors of this land; those who took this land from those to whom it rightfully 'belonged'.

Radical accommodation necessitates that we adopt a servant leadership model in our spiritual and secular approaches to life. As this organization ages and achieves maturity in its wisdom let us carefully consider how we might 'leave it all on the ice'.
