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PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

It is an honour for me to address the whole AOTS membership and the multitude of churchmen affiliated with the men's clubs of Canada and Bermuda. I am proud to be a member of the Westworth AOTS Club in Winnipeg and to be a part of the larger association which reaches from sea to sea. I thank you most sincerely for the trust you have placed in me.

Before I move on to comment on the tasks ahead, I would like to recognize a number of persons and groups who have given me faithful support and from whom I look for continuing encouragement. The first is my wife, Margaret, who not only cares for the family and home while I am away but provides insights and inspiration on many issues relating to the role of the laity in the church. Without her complete support I would probably not be your president. I would also like to give recognition to the four provincial presidents; their hard work and advice on a multitude of matters over the past two years has been tremendous. Of course the group which make up the National Council are to be much admired; they have contributed hundreds of hours of time to keep the AOTS national network functioning. Space does not permit me to mention those gentlemen by name but through their dedicated effort the "whole is much greater than the sum of its parts". Thanks fellows.

In this initial letter I would like first to reiterate our vision of AOTS being an important arm of the church today and to repeat the list of dreams which I presented at the recent annual meeting.

The Importance of AOTS

During the past two years I have noted two thrusts within our church which call for clear understanding of the role of AOTS both local and national. The first of these is a growing awareness of the role and responsibilities of laymen in the life and work of the church. It looks as though we are about to rediscover the Ministry of the Laity and to see laymen as important in the mission of the church as the Church in the World. At the same time lay groups across the country have expressed a desire for more adequate communication channels, consequently many local groups have seen the need to affiliate with the National Association. In order to respond to these thrusts I would like to remind you of some comments made by Don Smith at Halifax in 1977.

- The work of AOTS at all levels of the church in fostering genuine fellowship, encouraging spiritual growth and nurture, and encouraging men in action and service is recognized by discerning people everywhere.
- 2. Of particular benefit is the down-to-earth, practical expression of faith and action represented by the AOTS movement. It has been the sort of activity most attractive to many men -- something with which they could easily identify.

- 3. AOTS has been for many, a side-door introduction into the life and fellowship of the church and a vital first-step in nurture and leadership development. We ought to reaffirm our aim to be "an arm of the church reaching out in fellowship to all men."
- 4. The importance of a national organization and network is well documented; it can make a vital contribution to the church. The capacity to communicate with the men of the church and to represent them has proven to be invaluable.

DREAMS

That every layman of the church in Canada be afforded opportunities to become part of the AOTS fellowship; to experience a meaningful program of Christian service and to deepen his personal spiritual life.

The means of communication be developed which will enable all men to know the purpose and aim of AOTS and to belong to the fellowship either as a club member or as an individual member.

That a variety of AOTS programs be developed through which men in every walk of life may engage in practical expression of their faith as a means for personal self-development and self-fulfillment.

That AOTS men be catalysts, be active yeast in the society which is uniquely theirs. BUT this impact on their daily world is only part of their task. The Report of the Task Force on Ministry says:

"The good health and perhaps the survival of the church depends on whether or not it can hold up new vision to its people; a vision of a church wherein every person who has acknowledged the claim of Jesus Christ on his or her life has a ministry to perform — and that not a grim duty but a joyous privilege.

The men of the church must be encouraged to participate more fully by accepting responsibility at the local, conference and national levels of decision making of the church courts. Their experience, their abilities and their commitment of Christ must be expressed here as well as through their service and fellowship in AOTS.

Of course we must remember that <u>daring</u> is that quality which makes dreams come true. No one nor any group is every totally immune from fear and trepidation; however, dreams only become reality when one dares to overcome fear of failure and press on toward the goal. To quote Robert Schuller:

"I would rather attempt to do something great and fail, than attempt to do nothing and succeed."

ALAN STAIG

Newly appointed Associate Secretary - Ministry with Adults, in the Division of Mission in Canada, Alan Staig's responsibilities (among other things) include "leadership in programs and projects which will assist laymen to a deeper understanding of the meaning of faith".

A Londoner by birth, and holding an engineering degree from London University, Alan is a professional engineer of the Province of Ontario and for 26 years worked for the consulting engineering firm of Proctor & Redfern Limited, ending up as Manager of Administration and Personnel.

In Church affairs, Alan has been an elder of Cliffcrest United Church in Scarborough for the past 24 years, and in that time has served that congregation in a variety of ways including Sunday School, boys' work, outreach and worship.

He is a past president of two AOTS men's clubs, one in Ontario and one in Newfoundland(where he worked for three years as an engineer).

He is currently Vice-President of Alcohol and Drug Concerns, an Ontario organization committed to promoting a lifestyle that is independent of alcohol and other harmful drugs.

Alan has been a member of Presbytery for 18 years, and is a past chairman and secretary of Zone 1 of Toronto Area Presbytery. He has served on the Toronto Conference Interview Board, the General Council Candidature Committee and was a Commissioner to General Council in Calgary in 1977.

WHAT NOW, AOTS - Alan Staig

The 1979 AOTS National Convention is behind us, and as I write this, summer is still in full swing but with our thoughts turning already to the Fall and Winter ahead.

You will also recognize that I'm the "new boy" at 85 St.Clair, (at least as a staff person) and that it would be impudent of me to "come on strong" with grand plans for the future.

So - I'm not going to summarize AOTS work now and into the future

I'm not going to develop a strategy for AOTS to pursue
 I'm not going to exhort you into a fervour of enthusiasm.
 I do want to deal with three things - the past, the present & the future.

For each of us, the past is different and unique, a mosaic of human experience that is so rich and diverse as to make our comprehension of it baffling. Some of us - reflecting on our view of the mosaic - may wistfully pine for the "good old days". Before you shake your head and say "No sir, not me", think whether you would like to see AOTS as numerically strong as it was in the mid-50's. But the 1980's will not be the same as the 1950's: we cannot tutn back the clock.

What about "Now" - that fleeting instant between the past and the future? Jesus exhorts us to "seek FIRST the kingdom of heaven". That single word "FIRST" is startling in its demand to each of us and catches the urgency that runs as an unbroken thread through the Gospels.

What Now. AOTS? cont'd-

Today in Church and in AOTS we have dedicated loyal and faithful people; their capacity to serve the Lord, their willingness to witness is limitless. For this we need to shout a song of thanksgiving. I see Christian people today - NOW - as more confident, more vibrant, more effective, more loving than ever before. This is exciting and great!

As we look to the future we can be sure of one thing - change. Tomorrow will not be the same as today or yesterday - it will be better, and you and I will make it so.

What do you want to see in AOTS in the 1980's?

Do you wish for greatness?

-how will you measure that?

Do you want to be more effective?

-for what purpose?

Do you want to respond to the needs of society?
- what are those needs?

Do you want to set priorities?

- what is most urgent?

Do you want to serve the Lord Jesus Christ?

- let's not lose sight of him.

What does all this say to you in AOTS? May I suggest it says:

- 1. Reflect on the past, give thanks for its glories, but be grateful we are no longer there.
- 2. Soak up the experiences of today, so that they form part of your mosaic of history as you move into tomorrow, and be glad.
- 3. Plan for tomorrow not in some great pyramiding concept that may not respond to the needs of tomorrow but plan to make things happen that will strengthen the work of the laity of the church.
- 4. And, as Paul wrote to the Ephesians so many years ago: "Finally then, find your strength in the Lord in his mighty power, so that you may be able to stand firm against the devices of the devil... give yourselves wholly to prayer and entreaty; pray on every occasion in the power of the Spirit. To this end keep watch and persevere, always interceding for all God's people."


