

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us," was the question asked seven hundred years before the birth of Christ. Isaiah answered, "Here am I, send me." And the voice spoke again, saying, "Go and tell the people...".

The question is just as relevant today as it was in Isaiah's day, and the command is just as urgent. Iithin our nation there is much for us to be concerned about, and much to cry out against. As Lay people, and particularly as AOTS men and UC Women who have declared ourselves as PEOPLE OF THE CROSS, there can be no faint hearts, but stouthearted men and women, ready to take a stand against the ravages of gross immorality and nation-wide gambling unprecedented in Canadian history.

Not to raise a voice of protest is to condone or give approval. The purveyors of moral injustice will tell us, Christ's followers, to conduct our prayer meetings and mind our own business. Our response to them will be, WE ARE DOING BOTH.

As president of this great National Association of AOTS, I feel a compoelling responsibility to urge you spend time in your meetings, whether at the Club, District or Council level, discussing these matters with a view to making re-

presentation or protest to appropriate Government ministers that they might effect remedial action.

The AOTS Association of men can be the 'harbinger' of a return to a more civilized and respectable society. This will happen only if we answer with one voice, as Isaiah answered, "Here am I, send me."

Since my first letter to you, the old calendar has come down, and another has taken its place, indicating the march of time. Let us determine that 1984 will be a year spent in useful service to God and humankind. Then, and only then, will we be able to clearly understand the purpose of our lives, and see with clearer perception the Will of the Creator in bringing us to this hour.

Rise up 0 men of God!
The church for you doth wait,
Her strength unequal to her task;
Rise up and make her great.

My New Year's wish is that you may have a profitable and enjoyable year in AOTS service.

OUR NATIONAL HOSPITAL PROJECT

At its 13th National Convention the AOTS delegates approved unanimously the proposal to assist the medical work of United Church Hospitals. In 83/84 the fund-raising goal of \$16,000.00 has been set to fund the Native Indian training programs at the R.W. Large Memorial Hospital in Bella Bella, BC.

R.W. LARGE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

For over 100 years medical missionaries, initially with the Methodist and subsequently with the United Church, have been providing

hospital and clinic services along The R.W. BC's Northern Coast. Large Memorial Hospital, named after the Methodist missionary who built the first hospital, is a 23 bed acute care hospital -- the only hospital serving the Coast between Vancouver Island and Prince Rupert. It is located on an Indian Reserve where the predominant employment is Unemployment however, is fishing. very high and most members of the community lack technical, vocational and professional skills.

NATIVE TRAINING PROGRAMS

As a Church Hospital we are interested in providing more than medical care. In particular we believe that the hospital, as a professional institution and employer, can play a major role in helping local people acquire professional skills and fill responsible positions. With the help of the AOTS we are now in a position to see through to completion our first project in manpower training programs.

Two people on the staff of hospital are training to be a Business Manager and a Hospital Engi-The training programs for these two people were launched any assurance that the without necessary financial support would be forthcoming. This reflected a strong commitment by the professtaff at the hospital and a trust that the money would soon be The National Association of United Church AOTS Clubs are now providing the necessary financial support. The goal \$16,000.00 will cover most of expenses not met by manpower training grants.

We anticipate in 1984 that we can report the successful completion of these programs with your support and the AOTS can then look elsewhere in church medical work for another opportunity for Christian service.



G. BRYDON MCCREA NATIONAL HONORARY PRESIDENT DIES AT AGE 77

Two friends of AOTS died within four days of each other. G. Brydon McCrea, first National President of the United Church AOTS Mens' Clubs, and elected Honorary President at the Newfoundland Convention in 1983, died in Winnipeg on November 2, 1983. His beloved wife, Ruby, had died four days earlier. They had attended most national conventions and only Ruby's illness made it impossible for them to attend the 14th Convention in St. John's.

Brydon, at 18 years of age, was in attendance at meetings which brought about the United Church of Canada in 1925, and taught Sunday School in his youth while at Glen Mount United Church in Toronto.

Brydon and Ruby joined Knox United Church in Winnipeg after their arrival there in 1939. Brydon had become the Circulation Manager of the Winnipeg Tribune.

They both continued holding leadership positions in Knox Church—Brydon in AOTS, twice as president of the club, and Ruby in UCW, where she was a past-president. Brydon was an elder and Ruby was Secretary of the Board of Managers, the Official Board, and a member of the Duvall Foundation.

In 1946, Brydon became manager of McConnel, Eastman Advertising Agency. He subsequently became a vice-president and director of the national organization until his

retirement in 1969. He later founded and published the Lake of the Woods Area News.

Brydon was an active member of many organizations throughout his life, most notable being the Board of Regents of the University of Winnipeg, the YMCA, and the Kiwanis Club.

The McCreas leave three sons -Paul in Vancouver, David in Winnipeg, and Graydon in Edmonton. To
each of them and their families we
extend the prayerful and loving
sympathy of Christian Fellowship.

Today the lives of Brydon and Ruby McCrea are richer, fuller, crowned with eternal glory, enshrined forever in the heart of God. We hear the echo of the trumpets which have sounded for them on the other side. We see the lights they have left to guide us on our future journey — the light of faith, the light of truth, the light of love.

SPIRITUAL LIFE COMMITTEE

Chairman Keith MacDonald reports that his committee has held four meetings since Convention time. This Committee is located on Vancouver Island in Duncan, BC. We can expect to hear of some of their plans in future issues of the Newsletter.

This committee reports seven members centered in the Chatham, Ont. area and report two meetings since they were formed last summer. The Chairman, Dale Maris, in his report says, "For all of us this is our first encounter with the National organization and we are looking forward with eager anticipation to our term. Over this next two years this committee shall be involved with the development of the AOTS movement of tomorrow via the youth of today."

THIRTY YEARS OF HOSPITAL SERVICE -WINNIPEG-

The AOTS Men's Clubs of Winnipeg began taking patients in hospital to church services in the hospital chapel (those in wheelchairs, etc.) after the polio epidemic in 1953. This program has continued every Sunday service since this beginning and many Clubs and individual AOTS men have been involved.

On December 5th, 1983, recognition of the service of AOTS was celebrated in the form of a tea held at the Municipal Hospital Nurses' Res-The Hospital Chaplain, Rev. John Deck chaired the historevent, and remarks of appreciation were heard from the Hospital Administrator and the Board of the Hospital. Two of the original congregational chairmen, Larry of Home Street and Murray Kerr of Westminster, were in attendance and Murray gave an interesting picture of the history of the project and stories of some of the patients through the years.

Thirty years of fifty two weeks per year with 10 men each week adds up! Many of the original clubs are still involved. St. Andrew's-Elgin United Church initiated a feature of presenting a flower to each lady patient on Mothers' Day — this is still carried on, and this Club handles the entire month each May.

As a direct response to a message on the world food crisis delivered by Dean Shebeski of the University of Manitoba at the 1975 biennial convention, the National Association of AOTS Men's Clubs established the Colnett Scholarship Project. This plan provides funding for two scholarships awarded annually for support of students of Canadian and Bermudan universities and colleges who are studying in preparation for service in food production or distribution in developing countries. The prescribed areas of study are agriculture, home economics. fisheries, food science, agricultural economics, etc.

Since 1978 six awards of \$500 have been made to two male and four female applicants. Of this group, at least three are already involved in work on the international scene; one young man and his wife have received an overseas assignment with the United Church. The most recent recipients are:

- i) Miss Margaret Anderson of Forrest, Manitoba. Margaret holds a degree in Home Economics, has served with CUSO in Southeast Asia, and has just completed a Master's degree in Agriculture at the University of Manitoba.
- ii) Miss Wilma Koersan of Enderby, British Columbia. A graduate of the University of Alberta (1982), Wilma is now completing an on-site training program with the Valeo Cheese Co. in Finland.

The project has been well received and funded by the AOTS clubs across the country. All men are now encouraged to identify young persons who would be interested in the service related to food production and urge them to apply for the scholarships. Information is available from the Awards Offices of the universities, from the office of the Executive Secretary of the

National Association of AOTS Men's Clubs, and from the Project Committee (Room 406, Faculty of Education, University of Manitoba, Winnipeg, Canada).


