With this Life Member of AOTS being honoured as our Honourary President we trace his career of Service .It begins with his joining the Wilmar Heights club in 1955. In 1960 he served as Club President repeating that office in 1979. Meanwhile, in Sept. 1955 Sid formed from a nuecleus of 12 AOTS men the long renowned Scarborough AOTS Glee Club. At one time it numbered 45 members who, under Sid's direction entertained from coast to coast promoting AOTS and Christian Fellowship through song. They truly exeplified the name and aim "As One That Serves". The travels of the Glee Club included entertaining at the First National Convention in Canadian Keswick 1959 and at each subsequent Convention until Halifax in 1977. At each of these nine conventions Sid served as Music and Song Leader.

During the 60s,Sid was national Music Chairman. He promoed,assembled and and had printed the original AOTS Song Book complete with music.The Glee Club made a LP sing along Record to accompany

the Song Book,primarily for those clubs without musical leadership.

Through the years and right up to the present date he has continued as an active member of the executive of the Wilmar Heights Club and at the District Council level. He is still active as a song leader at Conferences and Round Ups. Currently Sid is director at the Taylor Place Seniors Choir which this year placed first in its class at the Toronto Kiwanis Music Festival winning a \$250.00 scholarship. He has served continuously on the KiwanisFestival Council as Marshall

and Chairman.

He is retired from his job as Plant Manager at Grand and Toy Ltd. Sid is encouraged and aided in his many activities by his lovely wife Dorothy, a well known figure in her own right both in AOTS and the United Church, and is supported by his daughter Jane, son Hugh, and Granddaughter Rhonda-Lynn.

Jean Beliveau-Christian

This world famous hockey player may have retired as a sportsman but he continued to pursue his lifetime christian faith by witnessing to some 600 fellow Christians on the occasion of British Columbia Leadership Prayer Breakfast. Often honoured by standing ovations for his excellent hockey this time he was visibly humbled by a standing ovation as he searched for some answers

through the teachings of

Christ.

We were challenged to ponder with him as he asked: What is My Purpose ? What was my Purpose? with the answer in the words of Jesus. Love is my purpose."Obviously said,"the course we follow to our destiny depends on many factors, one being the use of the gifts given to us by God." "No matter if you are a hockey player,a

banker, a craftsman or clerk, is the purpose simply not love?"

He expressed concern about the "Stumbling blocks of dogma, rules, and regulations that challenge the faith of our children and grandchildren.: They have their place but should never be implemented without love.

."By this time Jean had not only captured us in his trip of faith through life but he had made us all wish that we had brought that questioning neighbor or perhaps our son for surely they would follow this outstanding Christian Athlete into Christ's training camp.

Witnessing as Jean did this day was admittedly difficult for him. His preference would be to face 15,000 irate Montreal Hockey Fans for he could win their hearts by scoring a goal or two. He won our hearts by scoring with sincerity and his expressed dedication to his faith Jean reminisced about the only two where he faced similar audiences .His-

first such venture was before the National Prayer Breakfast in Ottawa where he was introduced by John Diefenbaker and where he told his story to the busi-Page 4

ness and political leaders of our country. His second triumph was before the Jew ish Arabic Friendship Society. His nervousness on this occasion was heightened by a bomb threat that caused the Hotel to be evacuated. However as they returned and Jean spoke, the friendship society responded to his message with vet another standing ovation."I thought I had found the answer to the Mid East

> crisis for that night there was great felbetween lowship Christian . Moslem and Jew as we danced in to the wee small hours of the morning."

Jean thrilled us further as he lead us through his hockey career which he summarized as a success because of discipline, teamwork, support of his teammates and above all the support

of God. He concluded with an imagined day of judgement to find himself wanting under his own guidance but that "his cup runneth over" under the guidance of Christ.


Thamesview Plows a Straight Furrow.

The D.R. Poole Award
The Man

Who was D.R. Poole? Why was his name applied to an award for Youth Work? There follows a brief background which only touches on this man's greatness in the world of Christianity, Youth, and Men's work.

Delbert Russell Poole was born in 1882 on a farm near Woodstock Ontario. He responded to the call of the Church and served as a student minister in Saskatchewan, and his study at Brandon College. However instead of becoming an ordained minister,DR joined the YMCA staff. In 1926, he became National Boy's work secretary and later was named the General Secretary of Religious Education for Canada.

DR became interested in AOTS while on a visit to British Columbia and in 1946 started on a part time basis, as Executive-Secretary of the General Council in Vancouver. As AOTS continued to expand into the Western

Provinces and across Canada. It became known as the National Association of AOTS Clubs and D.R. Poole became it's first National Executive Secretary. He helped establish "The Older Boy's Parliament" in Western Canada. This worthwhile institution had many of its members to go out and lead the country in business and politics.

There is no doubt his experience and ability in promotion, his enthusiasm and dedication he had gained in his previous work, along with his personal charm, was just what the AOTS needed. DR used his previous experience in Boy's Work to help promote youth work in AOTS and in those early days a large portion of the movement's service went in that direction.

DR retired in 1956 and it was decided to honour him by establishing the D.R. Poole Award.

The trophy is awarded at each Biennial National Convention to the AOTS Club with the best support program for youth. winners All conference are remembered with a certificate of their achievements. All clubs are eligible and it is not necessarily the largest club that wins. A 15 member club in Halifax, a 25 member club in Winnipeg, and a 30 member club from Harrow have all been winners. Why not have your club make an entry next year?. Perhaps you might win but most certainly by entering you will keep alive the spirit of service to youth within the ranks of AOTS. Look for entry froms in March 1990.

Resolutions

To Read Two Letters Two Resolutions
From The 16 Biennial National AOTS Convention
To the Rev Howard M Mills Secretary of General Council

Dear Dr. Mills:

The following resolution, #1 was approved by the 16th Biennial National AOTS Convention held at Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B., July 7-9,1989. I have been instructed to send it to you, as Secretary of General Council, for the action called for therein.

#1 Whereas the National Association of United AOTS Men's Clubs, at it's 15th Biennial Convention of August, 1987, expressed concern about the time and money being spent on the study of homosexuality and pornography;

and whereas the National AOTS Executive . at it's meeting of Oct.1, 1988, voted to oppose the report entitled "Toward a Christian Understanding of Sexual Orientation, Life Styles, and Ministry", and Communicated this message to the National Office of the United Church;

and whereas many congregations and ministers are opposed to the ordination of practicing homosexual persons, some having expressed their opposition by leaving the Church;

and Whereas the National AOTS Council, at its annual meeting of Oct. 1st 1988, voted to oppose, also, the action of the 32nd General Council on the foregoing report, as represented in the document entitled "Membership, Ministry and Human Sexuality"

(MMHS), A Statement of the United Church of Canada by the 32nd General Council;

Be it resolved, therefore, that this 16th Biennial National

AOTS Convention call on the 33rd General Council to take, with respect to the MMHS document, one of the following actions: declare it to be an historic document, and therefore of no effect within the Church, or delete the phrase regardless of their sexual orientation" as it relates to ordination or commissioning

Would you please acknowledge this letter and let us know what action will be taken.

#2 Whereas the National Association of AOTS Men's Clubs(The National AOTS) and the United Church Women are Church-wide organizations, and are recognized as such in the United Church Manual;

and whereas these organizations represent men and women of the Church;

and whereas there is, at present ,no assurance that duly appointed representatives of either organization, as members of the Conference, will be elected as Commissioners to the General Council of the Church;

Be it resolved, therefore, that this 16th Biennial National Convention call on the Executive of General Council to initiate a change to the Basis of Union such that The National AOTS and the United Church women may each be entitled to appoint four representatives to the General Council, those representing The National AOTS to be the National President and the three regional Vice-Presidents, each of the later representing one of three regions: Eastern, Central, and Western.

Would you please acknowledge this letter and let us know what action will be taken.

Referring to the reduction in disbursements, the treasurer said although costs are up in some areas there have been substantial reductions in otheres: \$4,460 in salary payments to the Executive Director, \$1,577 in travel costs(President and Excecutive Director) \$976 in costs of the Executive meetings, \$1,414 in office printing costs, and \$751 in purchase of supplies for resale.Reporting on the accounts, he said the amounts on deposit were as follows: general account, \$19,605.93, H Colonett *Funds \$23,598.36, and Hospital Project *\$8,425.12.
