Presented two cheques, one from Wilmar Heights, one from TC AOTS both for \$100.00. AOTS Committee pleased to learn that there is one group in the TCC and the church that supports them.

Toronto Conference AOTS Executive Welcomes new members. Tom Reid ,the new President of Wilmar Heights AOTS. Ray Cockburn, the President of Kingston Road AOTS and Dave Thompson Individual AOTS member representing Toronto West Presbytery.

Executive still considering AOTS and Men's work in the Toronto Conference and Nationally. Expecting major contribution to this subject.

Visits-Contacts

To Kingston Rd. and Wilmar Heights AOTS.

Spoke at invitation of Minister to Men of five local churches. Also spoke about AOTS and Men's work at the hosting Church's Worship Service.

Discussed with other Ministers in Conference re setting up Men's groups.

North American Conference Church Men's Staff Louisville Ky. Jan 8 to 13, 1991

Bob attended the above representing AOTS and the United Church of Canada.

There were 40 men in attendance, 38 Americans and 2 Canadians. The latter included our Bob and Ron Higgins of the Atlantic Conference Canadian Baptist Men.

The speaker was Roy Oswald of the Alban Institute speaking on the Conference Theme, "Masculine Spirituality and The Church's Response." His addresses, covered such subjects as Male/Female Continuum, 4 different types of Men, based on Education and Income, Masculine Spirituality and Male Sexuality.

In between the main presentations, we broke into small groups of 6 and 7 to discuss questions related to the topic which had been presented.

The fellowship, during the group discussions, at the meals, before and after. is hard to describe unless one was there. It can not be explained.

All the AOTS material and the copies of the United Church Observer which he took down were picked up. Men's Work Material from the other denominations was brought back and a Resource List is in preparation. The North American Conference Church Men's Staff will be holding its 1992 meeting in Toronto, Canada next January. The Theme will be "Christian Men in the Work Place."

A Threat to Unity Part I by Rev Ray Sadler *

John Fawcett was a highly respected

British preacher of a few generations back. As his fame spread, a call came to him from an important pulpit in the city of London. But he had served his small town congregation for many years, he deeply loved his people, and so he thought and prayed long and hard before resigning.

Eventually the day came for his leaving, the packing was all comple. But just as they were preparing to go, the

whole congregation descended upon the rectory, gathered around their beloved pastor and his family, and begged them to reconsider and remain with them.

Deeply moved by their sincerity, Mrs Fawcett turned to her husband and said, "Oh, John, I can not bear this! I don't know how I can leave!" "Nor do I either, "enjoined the good pastor. "Nor will we go." Unload the wagons and put everything back in its place. "We are staying!"

And that very night John Fawcett sat down in his study, and inspired by the thoughts of that loving congregation, penned the beautiful lines of the hymn:

Blest be the tie that binds
Our hearts in Christian love:
The fellowship of kindred minds
Is like to that above."
How wonderful to be part of a

Christian fellowship where that kind of harmony and bonding love are so clearly evident. There are few things in the wor-Id to match it! And I must say that here at South Burnaby United Church I have always felt that overriding spirit of love and good will to be very much a part of our fellowship. And, this is not just something that has "just happened by accident, but rather something that you as a congregation have always worked at...so this church might become more nearly a living reflection" of the Lord's own love and caring in the community of South Burnaby. May we never lose that wonderful vision!

Such harmony in the fellowship is not something to be taken for granted but rather should be guarded with care. For as St. Paul knew, and we ourselves understand from our own personal experience - there is always the threat, the differences- sometimes small, but sometimes very big ones- might one day invade our church family, and if not handled with understanding and compassion, those differences have the potential for dividing us right down the middle! And saddest of all, those differences are not always concerned with matters of doctrine that affect the major tenets of our faith. They may have to do with the "middle matters" or judgement calls on issues of morality or social conciousness. That is, areas of the Christian life where equally sincere believers may have honest differences of opinion. And it is here that the blessed "ties that bind" may be blasted and the fellowship broken.

In the 14th chapter of Romans verses 7,8

St. Paul attempts to deal with just such a problem. First of all, it is important to note that he opens his letter with words of thanksgiving and praise for what God has done in the Roman Church. Romans 1: 7,8). "And you dear friends, are among those God dearly loves,: Let me say first of all that wherever I go I hear you being talked about! For your faith in God is becoming known around the world. I thank God for this good report, and

for each one of you!" Paul goes on to say how he longs to visit the Roman Church, for he believes these people have a very special place - a special role to play- in

And you,dear friends, are amongst those whom God dearly loves,"! For your faith in God is becoming known around the world.

Romans 1:14:7-8

the coming of the Kingdom. And so, the opening sentences are full of love and joy and encouragement, all of which must have cheered the hearts of those early Christians.

But no church is without its problems. So Paul then tackles an issue which threatens to divide the Church of Rome for which he had such high hopes.

Within the Roman church, there were two camps. There were those who believed that Christ had wiped away the old food regulations and Sabbath laws. Rituals which for centuries had been scrupulously observed by the Orthodox Jews as meticulously laid out in the 11th Chapter of Leviticus.

And so there were those new Christians in Rome who had dragged their past as Jews into this new religious experience. They felt very strongly about retaining the old ways alongside the new. And although it is very difficult for us to imagine today, in Paul's time many believers looked upon food and Sabbath laws as "life and death" issues over which there erupted fierce debate.

Others in their midst-especially among the gentiles - firmly believed that Christ had released them from bondage to the past - that Christ had won final relief from the horrendous array of rules and regulations that had become " religion " for the Jews. And had not Christ himself liberated the Sabbath as a time for worship and rest and creativity when he said to the Pharisees, "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for Sabbath!"


