This column in its search for Prayer Study Groups* has with God's help found as suspected that the numbers are legion. Before we share yet another discovery, a friendly reminder that we want to hear from you. Our source once again is the B.C. Image which is a regional insert in the Observer.

Since when has Bible Study in the church become Good News . well when people become excited about doing it, it becomes Good News.

Last summer Fern Sanson, who lives in McBride, asked me where she could get hold of of some good, study material for adults wanting to learn more about the Bible. I suggested that she inquire of the United Church Bookstore in Edmonton. They sent her the "Whole People of God Adult Bible Study" packet.

After that Fern never looked back. All through this year, between eight and 12 women have been meeting in Fern's home on Wednesday morning. At first they were a "little frightened"she said, but the gatherings were not intended to argue about religion, rather to look carefully into the Bible, trying to determine " what is it saying to us to-day."

Looking back on the weekly experience since last Fall, Fern (who certainly doesn't consider herself a biblical scholar) says it, was a very rewarding time." and would heartily recommend "the Whole People of God material to anyone thinking of starting a local study group.

There is Good News in many ways here not the least of which is the demonstration of what lay people can do in times of a clergy shortage.

One custom that has survived down through years is the bringing of clothes for the less fortunate. These men are served by First United which is one of Vancouver's intercity mission churches.






The Charlie Burritt Fund

Dr. Newberry has replied to queries made on your behalf by the Handshake. I am sure you will agree, the getting down to a personal basis ,as far as fund distribution goes, makes the whole thing worthwhile.

Dear Fellows.

The AOTS did indeed contribute money towards the equipment for our Opthalmic Clinic.(see image across) Your group will be happy to know we now have an opthalmologist working

with us, based in Hazelton but covering a major portion of the northwest. The equipment he uses varies depending upon the clinic he is working from, but the equipment bought by AOTS is based here in Hazelton and is used on a regular basis. In addition this opthalmologist is now able to carry out cataract surgery among other things, for which the equipment you helped supply is invaluable.



Grants

One has been made using your funds to a young man who has been doing some volunteer health work in the Community of Hazelton and now has gone on to further his studies at the University level. The grant was used to assist him to register for his program and make his move to his new community.

In addition, the sum of \$1,000.00 has been forwarded to a medical student and his family, who has begun the third year of medical training at the University of British Columbia. This man came to medicine rather late in life, and is a resident of the Kispiox Valley near Hazelton. We felt it particularly appropriate that he be supported at this point. He intends to return to work with the United Church Health services wherever he is needed.

In addition funds have been provided to support administrative staff in Newfoundland in making a transition from administration of an acute care hospital[to an extended care facility. (Baie Verte) The Newfoundland government has no funds available to provide for this additional extended training, and it is particularly appropriate that the church be involved in assisting in this development of responsibility and skill.



National Support Sought

On Sunday, Sept 22nd the 25 member AOTS club of Grace United Church,Sarnia Ontario passed the following two motions:

- 1. That the AOTS support the women of Canada in their campaign to stop violence against women.
- 2. That we seek the support of the National AOTS for the above motion.

Claiming your Inheritance

The Holy Spirit

When the apostle Paul came to Ephesus he met a group of disciples. Sensing something missing he asked, "Did you receive the holy spirit when you believed?" (Acts 19:2.) He discovered two things: they didn't know about the holy spirit or the Person of Jesus Christ.

Jesus is the Key

to knowing the Holy Spirit and entering into the spirit filled life. The Holy Spirit is known in the Old Testament but never given in His fullness until Pentecost. First there must be a model of the Spirit-filled life. The model is Jesus.

Jesus Promised


this same spirit to his disciples. On the day of the Pentecost the promise was fulfilled. Peter said the promise of the spirit was for all- Jew and Gentile alike.

How do we receive our inheritance?


Next Year

Threat To Unity Part III Rev Ray Sadler (Conclusion)

Having said all that, what do you suppose St. Paul might have to say to us to-day, in the midst of our own particular turmoil? I have a suspicion that he would begin by congratulating the United Church of Canada on its proud history of faithfulness and service, and commitment to the issue of justice and truth, and as we celebrate our 65th year we should rejoice in what we have been and in what we are!

But then perhaps St. Paul would also want to go with our pain. And what would he say to us. I think the clue is found in the same letter to the Romans, the 14th Chapter, where all of Paul's words are cast in the "mould of grace"... grounded in "love" and not law of rigid stances.. And there he warns against judgmental attitudes... against "name calling" ... against any kind of judgmental haughtiness to ridicule or contempt in trying to score points for either side. He

would remind us, too, that we ought never to assume that any one of us has the whole handle on the truth. And, he would point out that when judging others, we must also judge ourselveswith all our shortcomings and in all our sin. And his over-riding advice to the Romans - even with all their differences, even with all the heated debate- is not to "jump ship and run", but to stay put and work out the differences in love. True this is an agonizing proposition for some! But then real love always involves heartaches and pain and struggle... real love is seldom clear sailing all through the journey.

There are faithful members of the United Church of Canada, who were waiting for this year's Council, and depending upon the results, have threatened to leave our fellowship over the current sexuality debate on what they feel are sound moral grounds. I stand with them in many of their However, I have no concerns. intention of leaving the church, but plan to remain within... speaking the truth of God helps me to see it ... certainly being open and welcoming to all people... trying to listen and to understand... and seeking to be a

faithful disciple of Jesus Christ ever when there is bound to be controversy.

I hope that those of you who have your own doubts will likewise stay with the United Church, recognizing that on both sides we are faithful men and women struggling for the truth. Let us walk with one another, and listen to one another, and work with one another, in the sure hope that Christ will show us the right ... in the sure hope that the Holy Spirit is in control, and that God Himself will have the final say. For as Paul concludes, in the end "all of us will stand before God to be judged by him."

Bishop Handley puts it so clearly:

"How many a church controversy, now as then, would quickly die, Leaving room for a living truth, if the disputants could only gravitate to their always most beloved theme, to the praises and glories of their redeeming Lord Himself! It is at his feet, and in his arms, that we understand both his truth, and the thoughts, rightful or mistaken, of our brothers and sisters."

So may it be with us! Amen.


