Keep Going For God's Sake!

Listening in and taking part in a phone conversation with a neighbouring friend, who was taking a call from another acquaintance that is serving as a missionary in a far off land, I noted, he always ended our conversations with the phrase, "I'm really having fun serving Him here."

From listening to the tone of his voice during the conversation, I am sure the word "fun" here means *pure pleasure* and not just a sense of amusement. For he conveys how pleasurable it is to be an instrument in God's hands —

comforting the sick and those in pain, helping with family problems, and doing all kinds of good deeds in the name of the Lord.

I would think the author of Psalm tive mode. 126 would also agree. For the whole six verses just stand out with a spirit of joy and gladness from start to finish. Verse one opens reminding us of a time when God "brought back the captivity of Zion." He delivered His people from a very serious situation what we do not know. It was like a dream come true. The result was that the people were filled with joy, laughter, and hearty singing. Exactly God's promise! [V5] "Those who sow in tears shall reap in joy."

I am reminded here of the story of Epaphroditus. (Phil.2: 17-30), who sacrificially cared for Paul's needs (Vs.25-30). There you read the examples of caring, love, and true compassion! Now, not all of us could set aside our lives as they did. But, their sacrifice can teach *all of us*, about the value of servanthood.

Lastly, to wind up this message, there is an old saying that goes something like this: "Old age is a matter of mind over matter. If you don't mind, it doesn't matter." At that stage, far too many people put the body in neutral. And, Christian Men, too often, put their service for Christ in the same inactive mode.

Remember our Club's Aims: to promote Christian Fellowship, deepen Spiritual Life and develop Christian Service. It means that each of us has a responsibility to God, as long as He gives us physical and mental strength, to work heartily for the Lord. We are never called to retire from life, at any age, and just coast down hill to heaven.

Let's make sure *old age* doesn't stop us from bearing fruit. Let's keep going for God. Let's Stay Youthful and Stay Useful.

The United Church Observer on Tape

This project is for people who are sight-challenged and who enjoy listening to taped recordings of the *Observer* magazine. Since 1983, volunteers have been reading every issue of the Observer onto audio cassette tapes for distribution across Canada.

Since 1997, Eastminster United Church in Belleville, Ontario, has been home to volunteers from the AOTS club who produce and distribute the tapes. The volunteer team has expanded to include other members of the Eastminster church family. With the help of donations from the recipients of the tapes, the recording studio has been improved. Our project team has also received financial help from area AOTS clubs and from the National AOTS organization.

Over the years, sophisticated recording and copying equipment has been purchased. The training of volunteers is ongoing. Various problems reported by recipients have been overcome by technicians in our own congregation. The address database of recipients requires continuous updating.

During the past eight years, the volunteer readers have been impressed with the quality of the magazine and with the integrity of the reporters. Many letters tell us that our tapes help them maintain contact with the national church and they value the views of the letters to the editor.



Our project promotion team sends letters to churches across Canada, every year, encouraging them to submit names of those who need our service. Our promotional literature also encourages churches to promote subscriptions within their respective congregations.

This project has proved a blessing to our congregation. We celebrate our involvement with an annual picnic. We hope to make the 10th Anniversary of our project a special event.

They are comfortable for sitting during the day and can accommodate one adult overnight. They are on wheels and can be moved from room to room easily. Their versatility and comfort are extremely appreciated by both hospital staff and parents who are rooming in with their ill or injured child.

Holy Trinity United Church AOTS Men's Club

The 13 member Holy Trinity AOTS Club in Elliot Lake, Ontario, enjoyed a good year of AOTS activity and Fellowship in 2005. During the year they featured an Annual Garage Sale and 3 concerts to financially support their YOUTH to CAMP Projects. In 2005 the Club did not sponsor as many young people to a Christian Camp as in past few years only 12 this past summer- at a cost of \$1,200.00 for sponsorship and several miles of travel. However we were able to assist in other ways as well with donations of a 20 cu.ft. freezer and a dishwasher to Camp McDougall (Algoma Presbytery of London Conference) and almost 900 hotdog and hamburger buns, as well as, \$1,000.00 to Camp Lorain in Manitou Conference.

The Club has two goals in sponsoring concerts; first the proceeds are used to support our Youth To Camp Project and secondly we provide good concerts at a reasonable admittance cost to people of the community. Our community has a large percentage of seniors living on pensions, so they appreciate these concerts that are geared to a senior income.

The Club meets on the second Saturday of the month at 9.30 am at the Alpha Room of our church and enjoy the fellowship of coffee and muffins/donuts with the meeting. This past year our devotional period had been interesting discussions of living as a Christian man

in a secular world where we are not always a majority.

These discussions have attracted more men to the club so we expect our membership for 2006 to be increased by about 50%.

The Club annually conducts the Father's Day Worship service at Holy Trinity' with membership leading the worship then supplying and serving the social hour coffee and goodies following the service. This year is the 50th Anniversary of Holy Trinity and the AOTS will hold several concerts, the Yard Sale, the special Father's Day service and participate in the Anniversary project to provide a new 3 manual organ to replace the aging instrument that is so much a part of our Sunday worship. The Club looks forward to being active in Service for Christ - without a goal we would not be alive as an arm of the church in the community.

Known as the Harry Colnett Scholarships, these awards are designed to encourage students to prepare for service in international agriculture, aquaculture and education, particularly in projects related to the <u>production and distribution of food</u> in developing countries.

This scholarship plan developed from a deep concern about world food supplies sparked by information provided by Dean Shebeski of the University of Manitoba and by the interest of the late Harry Colnett, a long-time member of AOTS (an acronym for "As One That Serves") and a leader of men's work in Canada. It is hoped that this plan will assist a number of young people to direct their study toward preparation for international service.

Our plan for 2006 is to have two \$1000.00 scholarships available, the first to be presented at the end of this academic year, with applications to be received at the above address by May 25, 2006, and the second scholarship to be awarded following an application deadline of November 8, 2006.

You are invited to make these scholarships known to students in your faculty or school and if candidates apply, to provide (on request) some assessment of their capabilities and interests. HARRY COLNETT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

International Agriculture and Food Distribution

- 1. The National Association of United Church AOTS Men's Clubs will provide funds for provision of two scholarships of \$1000.00 each for Canadian or Bermudian students who wish to study agriculture, food sciences or aquaculture, preparatory for services related to food production or distribution in developing countries.
- 2. The major purpose of the scholarships is to provide financial assistance to worthy students, and thereby encourage good students to increase their interest in world food problems, and to obtain technical competence in some phase of the production and distribution of food.
- 3. The money will be available to candidates enrolling in a university program in which emphasis is placed on some aspect of food production and processing, such as agriculture, food sciences, fisheries, home economics, etc.
- 4. To qualify for a scholarship, the applicant must have completed a minimum of one year of study at an accredited institution. Applicants must enrol in a curriculum of an agricultural nature or otherwise related to the area of food production, processing, storage or distribution. The applicant must be a resident citizen of Canada or Bermuda and plan to enrol for study during the forthcoming academic year.
- 5. Applications and general information are available on request. Applicants should submit the following:
 - a) A one or two page letter of application. It is suggested that this letter should provide the selection committee the applicant's understanding of and dedication to service in the area of world food production.
 - b) Transcript revealing course selection and grades achieved to date.
 - c) Letters from two referees.


